

## Visual Analysis:

Before beginning this activity, think of images of commercial fishing. What comes to mind when you think about people and the fishing industry? Describe the images either in a short paragraph or in conversation with a partner.

Now select one of the photographs on the last page. Look deeply at the photograph you've chosen, using the following points to guide you.

- First Impressions: What is your overall impression of the photograph? What do you think is going on in the photo? What emotions do you sense are coming from the people in the photo?
- Content: What do you see in the photo (i.e., people, objects)? Describe them.
- Time Period: When do you think the photograph was taken? Could the photo depict a different period? Explain. What evidence helps support your thinking?
- Summary: From what you've observed, list three things you might infer from this photograph.

After reaching a summary, jot down your ideas, and if working together, convene to present your image and analysis. Listen to what others share. How did everyone arrive at his or her conclusion about his or her image?

Now look at the caption that accompanies your image. What information does it give you that you didn't pick up from your observation? How does it change the three inferences you made earlier? What does this teach you about your observation skills and the conclusions you made?

Large fish, such as trevally and marlin, are also caught, but these require larger pirogues, more crew and heavier gear. ABOVE RIGHT Offloaded from the pirogue, fish are moved to coolers and bins for transport or just carried on a tray, LEFT, to a market such as this one in Mbour, RIGHT, where fish are cleaned, sorted, sometimes cooked on grills and sold alongside a variety of other foods and wares.
