#### Introduction

Tanfis is an Arabic word describing a spiritual release akin to a long-held breath. Tanfis is also the title given to Hatim Belyamani's multiple musical journeys that are a centerpiece to the nonprofit organization Remix←Culture. These encompass artistic interpretations of traditional and cultural music performances adapted and transformed with modern electronic sounds and technological twists. Tanfis is the reflection of Belyamani's personal musical journey from classical pianist to "orchestra conductor from the future".

# Synthesis (6 minutes)

As a teenager, Belyamani largely dismissed Moroccan music, until one night in Marrakesh when he heard former Led Zeppelin frontman Robert Plant sing a Gnawa tune. The performance shifted his perspective. He began reflecting on the music of his own culture and how it fit alongside the sounds he was raised with.

A top <u>student</u> at the Casablanca American School, he graduated as valedictorian and entered Harvard University in 1995. While majoring in social studies, he explored music courses, drawn especially to <u>composing</u>—though he found it challenging without an <u>orchestra</u>. That changed when a roommate introduced him to <u>electronic</u> music,

with its <u>synthesizers</u> and sound samples. "I realized I could hear my music without needing an orchestra at all," he says.

Still electronic pop music left him cold until he heard Icelandic singer Bjork's heavily electronic 1997 album, *Homogenic*. Bjork's use of <u>computers</u> to create "rhythms that were alive and that blended seamlessly with string sections and with live <u>vocals</u> so the electronic and acoustic were <u>harmonious</u>. I'd never heard anything like it," Belyamani says.

2 "I needed to reconnect with my family, with my home country, with my community"; "I felt so disconnected in the US and that feeling extended to my music."

3 "He gave Belyamani a crash course, not only on the music but also the Amazigh culture that had created it"; "Honor the source and context behind the music".

4 "He turned to his his Khenifra recordings and photographs"; "engage passersby for the 2012 festival"; "He designed an interactive music and image program that allowed people to create their own remixes of the original songs and images"; "The germ of Remix←Culture began to take root."

5 "Belyamani was back in Morocco seeking out more musicians around the country to film and record"; "In addition to Morocco, the team ventured to Brazil, China, Hungary, Lebanon, and Albania."

6 Answers will vary, but students should evaluate and explain the importance of the different events, experiences and interactions that motivated Belyamani along his musical journey.
