#### Visual Analysis:

Create a visual timeline that shows how Mouga Hill Rice has traveled across places and generations and how its meaning has changed over time.







#### Instructions

- 1. Read the article Moruga Hill Rice: A Link Across Generations.
- Build a timeline with at least six key events from the article. Include the following: A) a date or approximate period; 2) a short description of the event;
   why the event matters or what changed.
- 3. Add a visual for each event. The image may come from the article, your own drawing or a photo you locate from a safe online search, or even a symbol such as a seed, ship, field, if no real image exists.
- 4. Make sure your completed timeline shows where the rice originated, how it traveled, who protected and preserved it and how its meaning continues today.

## Mini-Guide: How to Add Images to Your Timeline

Choose pictures that connect clearly to the event. Strong image choices will either:

- Show what happened (ex: farm seeds, tools, land mentioned in the article), or
- Represent the meaning of the event (ex: a lock for loss, a bridge for connection).

Tip: If the picture helps you explain the event, it's a good choice.

If printing: Print the image and glue, tape or draw the image in the cell.

If using a PDF: Click inside the picture cell, select "Add/Insert/Browse" image; choose your saved photo, then click "OK".
